



Literature vs Lit/Lang


- □ Both include coursework which makes up 20% of the grade
- Both require you to read and analyse set texts including Shakespeare and pre-21st
 Century
- Both have exams that are open book!
- Lit/Lang has non-fiction and includes creative writing as part of the coursework
- Literature involves critical reading of texts and poetry
- Literature is the big ideas and concepts, whereas Lit/Lang is more technical terminology and specificity.



What are English Literature lessons like

Multi-layered approach to teaching including:

- Debates
- Group Discussions
- Reading and performance
- Mini games and quizzes
- Exam question activities
- Creative tasks
- Research



How will a 100-minute lesson be used?

- More opportunities to practice academic and literary skills such as debating and discussing to better prepare students for the rigours of university
- More time to read through and examine key scenes across texts in depth
- More opportunities to practice exam skills including extended writing, comparison, critical reception
- More opportunities for critical analysis using wider reading and research




Beyond A Level
